



AUTHOR INTERVIEW

What was your relationship like with *The Golden Girls* before you began to write *Murder by Cheesecake*?

I'm a long-time fan, but I rediscovered my love for *The Golden Girls* during the early days of the pandemic when it became my comfort watch. My nervous system would calm down once the show intro played. The warmth of the friendship between Dorothy, Rose, Blanche, and Sophia and all the fabulous jokes were my escape during a tough time.

What inspired you to set the book around a wedding and Rose's family?

I wanted to bring in goofy St. Olaf traditions while also keeping the first book in the familiar setting of Miami. A destination wedding is already full of potential for shenanigans and problems—even without a dead body to complicate matters. Weddings are also fun and joyful occasions, and I thought the Girls would plan an amazing one, even in challenging circumstances.

What do you think draws audiences to cozy mysteries?

I love cozies for the characters, the settings, and the vibes. I love to spend time with characters that feel like new or old friends, and I really wanted the experience of reading this novel to feel like sharing a slice of cheesecake with Girls. Cozies explore dark themes—like crime and murder—but they also center other aspects of life, and I love that balance.

Were there challenges when it came to writing about a show set in the 80s?

The Golden Girls was ahead of its time in so many ways, which made it a joy to translate for modern audiences with 21st-century sensibilities.

The main challenge came with trying to translate such an iconic show into prose. The show had excellent writing, and the performances are top-notch. So much humor and emotion can be conveyed with tone or visually with actors' expressions and gestures—and I wanted to make sure that reading this book felt like a fun, immersive, and nostalgic reading experience... which can feel a bit different from watching TV or reading a television script.



AUTHOR INTERVIEW

Were there ways that you wanted to bring in some authentic experiences or memories into the storytelling?

While I was writing *Murder by Cheesecake*, I immersed myself in the *Golden Girls* world—watching the show over and over, and of course, taking my cheesecake-tasting duties seriously.

I asked family members who lived in Miami in the 80s lots of questions about life during that time, since I was a little kid then, and some of those details pepper the book. I enjoyed letting out my goofy and wholesome side in Rose's sections, and my more analytical side with Dorothy.

The Golden Girls have such a universal appeal, so it's easy to identify with one or more of the girls—and I had fun adding in little tidbits from my own life. For example, at bridal showers in my family, we'll make a hat for the bride out of a paper plate and pile ribbons from the gifts on her head... and I took that tradition to the extreme for Nettie.

When it came to writing *Murder by Cheesecake*, which of the *Golden Girls* was the most fun to write?

I really identify with Rose and Dorothy the most, but the quips from Sophia and Blanche allowed me to be a little more cutting (in Sophia's case) or raunchy (as Blanche) than I would normally be, and that was really fun!

Your cheesecake recipe is featured at the back of the book! If you were to sit down and share a slice with just one of the *Golden Girls* who would it be and why?

Yes—and it's delicious! I'm very lucky to have grown up with a mom who is an excellent cheesecake baker, and I asked for her help when developing a new recipe for the book. I wanted it to be traditional enough to appeal to lots of people and to also have some St. Olaf flavor. Honestly, I love the girls and would want to share it with all of them. If I had to pick, I'd sit down with Dorothy, since I put her through so much in this novel, and we'd talk about our favorite books and have a lot of laughs.

AUTHOR INTERVIEW

What can readers expect from the rest of the series?

In this book, Dorothy and Rose took the spotlight... though Sophia and Blanche played important roles as they worked together to attempt to pull off a last-minute wedding and solve a murder. In the next book, all the girls will play a part, but Blanche will get her moment in the sun. The girls will have learned a thing or two from solving their first mystery, so their sleuthing skills will be a little sharper.



DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- 1) Share your knowledge of *The Golden Girls*. If you came to the book already familiar with the characters, did you feel like the book lived up to your expectations? If you're new to the *Golden Girls* characters, would you recommend this book as a good entry point to their world?
- 2) Friendship is a central theme for *The Golden Girls*. In what ways did you see their friendships tried and strengthened here?
- 3) The past weighs heavily on the shoulders of characters in this book. Rose grapples with proving she's still a St. Olaf girl, Dorothy sifts through old hurts on the road to new love, Jason seeks to stop his family's history of taking control over his life, and more. Discuss how you see this theme playing out throughout the novel.
- 4) For a portion of the book, Rose says Dorothy is the reason "they were in this mess to begin with." Did you think her feelings were justified or did you believe that they were misdirected? Why or why not?
- 5) As you were reading, which characters were you suspicious of and why? Did you think Henry was a con man or an innocent bystander caught up in some trouble?
- 6) Did you ever suspect Henry was a twin? What was your reaction to the reveal?
- 7) Were you suspicious of Chip while reading? What clues indicated that he wasn't to be trusted?
- 8) Wedding traditions are very important to Rose in this book. Are there any wedding or marriage traditions from your family or culture that you love?
- 9) While all of the Girls are in *Murder by Cheesecake*, the book largely focuses on Rose's connection with her past and Dorothy's desire for a relationship. What are elements of Blanche and Sophia's lives you'd like to see explored in a future series installment?
- 10) As a reader, what draws you to cozy mysteries? What elements do you think are essential for a book to be considered a cozy mystery?


- 11) Which would you rather do: plan a last-minute wedding or solve a murder?



BOOK CLUB BEVS

A fun beverage is a great treat for a book club meeting. Here are options excerpted from *The Golden Girls Cookbook: Cheesecakes and Cocktails!*

The Big Daddy AKA The Mint Julep MAKES 1 MINT JULEP

1-2 tsp sugar, preferably superfine

6 mint leaves

1½ ounces (3 tbsp) Kentucky bourbon Muddle the sugar and mint in a rocks or Old Fashioned glass until the mint leaves are very bruised.

Pour in the bourbon and fill the glass halfway with ice.

Give a big stir and serve.

Here? So Close to Cuba? Blanche's Take on a Mojito

MAKES 2

16 fresh mint leaves, plus sprigs for garnish

2 sugar cubes or 4 tsp white sugar, or to taste

1 lime, cut into 8 wedges

3 ounces (about 1/3 cup) white rum Club soda or sparkling water

Divide the mint leaves and sugar between 2 tall glasses. Drop 2 lime wedges into each glass.

Muddle all together until the mint is torn into rough pieces and the sugar is dissolved.

Stir half the rum into each glass, then fill with cracked ice.

Fill the glasses with sparkling water and stir. Float a lime wedge on top if you like.

BOOK CLUB BEVS

Rosemary-Infused Pear Nectar (With or Without Vodka)

MAKES ABOUT 3 CUPS, ENOUGH FOR 9 TO 12 DRINKS

½ cup simple syrup

2 big sprigs of rosemary

3 cups pear juice

1/4 cup lemon juice

If making the simple syrup, add 1 sprig of rosemary just before removing it from the heat. If you have syrup on hand, heat ½ cup of it until steaming, then drop in one sprig of rosemary.

Cool the syrup to room temperature. Don't leave the rosemary in the syrup much longer than that or the syrup will turn bitter. Pull out the rosemary sprig and pour the syrup into a 1-quart mason or other type of jar. Add the remaining sprig of rosemary, the pear juice, and the lemon juice. Screw on the top of the jar, shake well, and store in the refrigerator for at least 1 day before using and up to 1 week.

Rosemary-Pear Martini

MAKES 1 MARTINI

2 ounces (¼ cup) Rosemary-Infused Pear Nectar (above)

1½ ounces (3 tbsp) vodka of your choice

Wedge of lemon

Rosemary sprig and/or ½ lemon slice for garnish, optional Fill a small cocktail shaker two-thirds full of ice.

Pour the pear nectar and vodka over the ice.


Squeeze in the lemon.

Cap the shaker and shake vigorously until the outside of the shaker is frosty.

Strain into a coupe or small martini glass.

Garnish.

For a vodka-less mocktail, fill a tall glass with ice. Fill halfway with the pear nectar and add an equal amount of club soda or sparkling water. Drop or squeeze in a lemon wedge.



ST. OLAF'S KISS CHEESECAKE RECIPE

Spray or butter a 10-inch springform pan.

Crust

Crush graham crackers and slivered almonds in food processor.

Add melted butter and sugar. Process to combine.

Press evenly onto bottom and up the sides of the pan.

Filling

Preheat oven to 400 degrees.

Beat cream cheese, sugar, all-purpose flour, and vanilla. Then gradually beat in whole eggs, egg yolk, and cream.

Pour into pan and bake 15 minutes at 400 degrees.

For the crust:

2 cups graham crackers (12 full-size crackers)
1/2 cup slivered almonds
1/2 cup melted butter
1/3 cup sugar

For the filling

(all at room temperature): 32oz. (four 8-oz. packages)

cream cheese

1 cup sugar

1 tbsp all-purpose flour

1 tsp vanilla

4 whole eggs

1 egg yolk

1/2 cup cream

For the drizzle:

1 jar of lingonberries Sugar to taste Water as needed

Lower oven temperature to 250 degrees and bake 1 hour.

Remove cheesecake from oven and cool on wire rack. Refrigerate a few hours or overnight.

Lingonberry Drizzle

Slowly heat lingonberries in saucepan over low heat.

Add water one tablespoon at a time to thin the sauce to desired consistency and add one teaspoon of sugar at a time to desired sweetness.

Gently spoon the sauce in the middle of the cooled cheesecake and refrigerate to set. Serve by dipping knife in water and wiping the blade between slices.

What advice did the old sailor whisper to the rum-runners?


A Rum Regatta: Solution
